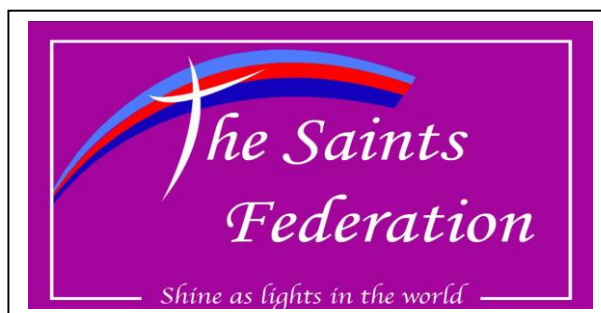


Saints Federation Intimate Care Policy

Introduction

The Saints Federation is committed to ensuring that all staff responsible for the intimate care of children and young people will undertake their duties in a professional manner at all times.



This school takes seriously its responsibility to safeguard and promote the welfare of the children and young people in its care.

Aims

This policy aims to ensure that:

- Pupils, staff and parents understand how our school will support pupils with or without medical needs who require intimate care
- Pupils with medical needs requiring intimate care are properly supported to allow them to access the same education as other pupils, including school trips and sporting activities

The Saints Federation will implement this policy by:

- Making sure sufficient staff are suitably trained
- Making staff aware of pupils' conditions, where appropriate
- Making sure there are cover arrangements to ensure someone is always available to support pupils with medical conditions
- Providing supply teachers/support staff with appropriate information about the policy and relevant pupils
- Developing and monitoring individual healthcare plans, when required

Legislation and statutory responsibilities

The Governing Body recognises its duties and responsibilities in relation to the Equality Act 2010 which requires that any child with an impairment that affects his/her ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities must not be discriminated against.

This policy meets the requirements under Section 100 of the Children and Families Act 2014, which places a duty on Governing Boards to make arrangements for supporting pupils at their school with medical conditions.

It is also based on the Department for Education's statutory guidance on supporting pupils with medical conditions at school.

We recognise that there is a need for children and young people to be treated with respect when intimate care is given.

No child shall be attended to in a way that causes distress, embarrassment or pain.

Staff will work in close partnership with parents and carers to share information and provide continuity of care.

Definition:

Intimate care is defined as any care which involves washing, touching or carrying out an invasive procedure that most children and young people carry out for themselves, but which some are unable to do. Disabled pupils may be unable to meet their own care needs for a variety of reasons and will require regular support.

Our approach to best practice:

- The management of all children with intimate care needs will be carefully planned.
- Staff who provide intimate care are trained to do so (including Child Protection, and Moving and Handling where appropriate) and fully aware of best practice.
- Where specialist equipment and facilities above that currently available in the school are required, every effort will be made to provide appropriate facilities in a timely fashion, following assessment by a Physiotherapist and/or Occupational Therapist.
- There is careful communication with any pupil who requires intimate care in line with their preferred means of communication to discuss needs and preferences.
- Staff will be supported to adapt their practice in relation to the needs of individual children taking into account developmental changes such as the onset of puberty and menstruation.
- Pupils will be supported to achieve the highest level of independence possible, according to their individual condition and abilities
- Individual care plans will be drawn up for any pupil requiring regular intimate care
- Careful consideration will be given to individual situations to determine how many adults should be present during intimate care procedures. Where possible one pupil will be cared for by one adult unless there is a sound reason for having more adults present. In such a case, the reasons will be documented.
- Intimate care arrangements will be discussed with parents/carers on a regular basis and recorded on the care plan
- The needs and wishes of children and parents will be taken into account wherever possible, within the constraints of staffing and equal opportunities legislation

Where a care plan is not in place and a child has needed help with intimate care (in the case of a toilet 'accident') then parents/carers will be informed the same day. This information should be treated as confidential and communicated in person, via telephone or by email

Intimate Care Tasks – cover any tasks that involves the dressing and undressing, washing including intimate parts, helping someone use the toilet, changing nappies or carrying out a procedure that requires direct or indirect contact to an intimate personal area. This may include medical needs.

Partnership with Parents/Carers – Staff at The Saints Federation work in partnership with parents/carers to provide care appropriate to the needs of the individual child and together will produce a care plan. A care plan will set out:

- What care is required

- Number of staff needed to carry out the task (if more than one person is required, reason will be documented)
- Additional equipment required
- Child's preferred means of communication (e.g. visual, verbal).
- Child's level of ability i.e. what tasks they are able to do by themselves
- Acknowledgement and respect for any cultural or religious sensitivities related to aspects of intimate care
- A regular monitoring and review plan in accordance with the child's development

Parents/Carers are asked to supply the following (delete as appropriate): -

- Spare nappies
- Wipes, creams, nappy sacks etc
- Spare Clothes
- Spare underwear
- Specialist equipment if required

Best Practice – When intimate care is given, the member of staff explains fully each task that is carried out, and the reason for it. Staff encourage children to do as much for themselves as they can, lots of praise and encouragement will be given to the child when they achieve.

All staff working in the Federation will have a valid DBS check. Particular staff members who are identified to change a child with known needs will record intimate care with that child.

Child Protection:

The Governors and staff of The Saints Federation recognise that children with medical needs, including toileting issues are particularly vulnerable to all forms of abuse.

Child Protection and Multi-Agency Child Protection procedures will be adhered to at all times.

If a member of staff has any concerns about physical changes in a child's presentation (unexplained marks, bruises or soreness for example) s/he will immediately report concerns to the Designated Safeguarding Lead and record concerns using the internal system.

If a child becomes distressed or unhappy about being cared for a particular member of staff, the matter will be investigated at an appropriate level and outcomes recorded.

Parents/carers will be contacted at the earliest opportunity as part of the process of reaching a resolution. Further advice will be taken from partner agencies.

If a child makes an allegation about a member of staff this will be investigated in accordance with agreed procedures.
